Overview of General Barriers to FDI in Hungary:

Regulatory barriers and administrative burden are affecting all sectors but particularly energy, construction, and banking: The overall administrative burden, including start-ups, negatively affects investment decisions. The instability of the regulatory framework, with frequent and unpredictable regulatory changes, creates uncertainty for investors and is hindering both internal investment and FDIs.

The Hungarian government imposes a 100% offset requirement for defined sector investments over HUF 1bln (EUR 2.8 mln). Efficiency of procedures in construction and environmental permits is insufficient; corruption also raises risk for investors. There is no requirement that investors must purchase from local sources, but the EU Rules of origin applies.

Ownership restrictions (all non-EU)

according to the 2014 Land Law, only private Hungarian or EU citizens resident in Hungary with a minimum of three years experience of working in agriculture or holding degree in agriculture can purchase farmland, which is limited to 300 hectares. All others may lease farmland. All farmland purchases must be approved by a local land committee and Hungarian authorities, local farmers and young farmers must be offered a chance to purchase the land first. Up to 1200 hectares for a maximum of 20 years may be leased.

Price controls in consumer facing sectors and others considered to be of strategic importance.

The Hungarian government regulates the prices of certain goods, setting the upper and lower limits to which the private sector must adhere. Sectors include energy, pharmaceuticals. Cuts on regulated utilities prices have put considerable pressure on private utilities companies, decreasing profit margins and adding to an increasingly difficult operating environment.

State intervention in Banking, energy, agriculture, media, telecommunications, and retail sectors.

Since 2012 government has invested in state-owned enterprises with the objective of lessening the participation of foreign-owned competitors, especially in the energy sector. From 1 Jan 2019, the chemical industry, the telecom sector, vehicle construction, metallurgy, optics and electric equipment production, the defence industry, water and sewage management, the financial sector, food industry and agriculture, production of construction materials, state administration, health care, wage management, transport and tourism sectors have been added. Foreign investors in the targeted sectors have expressed concerns that the tax regime has become unpredictable and the additional levies appear to have been aimed against some industries with a high level of foreign ownership.

Basic Rules of The Protection of Strategic assets Concerning Foreign investments

The European Commission has issued Communication 2020/C 99 i/01 in which it has given guidance to the Member States of the EU concerning the protection of Europe's strategic assets from the foreign direct investment, ahead of the application of Regulation (EU) 2019/452 (FDI Screening Regulation) which is applicable from 11 October 2020.Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/1298 of 13 July 2020 amended the Annex to Regulation (EU) 2019/452.

Hungary first adopted FDI screening mechanisms by act LVII of 2018 for FDIs violating the security interests of the country, then in the economic crisis caused by COVID-19, further screening rules were adopted for FDIs by Government Decree nr. 227/2020. (V.25.). According to the above, certain transactions concerning Hungarian-seated companies operated in strategic sectors by foreign investors shall be reported to the Minister of Finance and the acknowledgement of the Minister of Finance is necessary for the realisation of the acquisition of the shares until 31 December 2020. These transactions include the acquisition of shares, the increase of the registered capital and the transformation of the company. The strategic sectors specified by the Government Decree include energy, communication, finance, agriculture and food industry, healthcare, construction, transport industry, tourism, IT, mechanical engineering, etc. Those foreign investors that have shares in a company registered in the EU, European economic Community or in Switzerland shall only report the transaction if majority interest will be acquired indirectly. Conversely, the foreign investors wishing to acquire shares in a Hungarian company directly have to report any transactions by which the foreign investor would acquire shares at a ratio of at least 10% and the value of the investment is at least 350 000 000 HUF (appx EUR 1 mln). The Minister of Finance has 45 days or in specific and duly justified cases 60 days to decide on the acknowledgement of the transaction. Should the Minister provide a negative decision, then the exact reason of the prohibition is not required to be mentioned. Aggrieved investor may appeal before The Metropolitan Court for a review of the prohibiting decision.

Banking, agriculture, defence and energy

The Hungarian government has publicly declared that reducing foreign bank market share in the Hungarian financial sector and tightening regulations governing NGOs are key priority areas. Several state-led initiatives over the past several years targeted the banking sector and reduced foreign participation.

- 1. Inflation retreats to 16%: The year-on-year increase in consumer prices slowed to 16.4% in August from 17.6% in July, according to the Central Statistics Office (KSH), still the highest in the EU. Over the last 12 months, food prices have risen by 19.5%, with sugar (67.9%), bakery products (20.1%), and pork and sausages (19.7%) the most affected, while flour prices have fallen by 10.4%. Prices of alcoholic beverages and tobacco rose by 12.7% on average, including 16.4% for alcohol. Household energy rose by 34.7%, including a 47.1% rise for piped gas and 25.3% for electricity. Vehicle fuel prices rose by 31.1% and service prices by 13.2%, including highway use, car rental and parking by 24.6%, and vehicle repair and maintenance by 19.4%.
- 2. The number of guests who stayed in tourist accommodation in Hungary was 4.3% higher in July than in the same month of 2022 at 2.2 million, but the number of their guest nights fell by 1% to 6.4 million, according to the KSH. The number of domestic guests shrank by 3.6% and they spent 8.4% fewer nights than in July of last year. However, foreigners spent 13% more nights, yr/yr, as 19% more tourists stayed in Hungarian accommodation. Between January and July, domestic guests spent 8.1% fewer nights in tourist accommodation and foreign guests 13% more nights than in the same period of 2022.
- 3. industrial output short of 2022 levels: Hungarian industry's yr/yr performance was weaker in July for the seventh consecutive month, according KSH. However, the decline in output has slowed from 6.9% in May and 3.8% in June to 2.6% in the seventh month. The yr/yr decline in July was 2.5%. As has been the case for months, industrial output was lower than in the same month of last year, despite significant growth in the two largest sectors. Production in the automotive sector rose by 14.4% while electrical equipment output was 9.8% higher than one year earlier, largely due to the 24% rise in battery production. Pharma output grew by 21%, but all other sectors were badly hit. Electronic goods manufacturing, for example, fell by 5%, and food production by 9.3%. Rubber and plastic manufacturing fell by 20%, metal processing by 12.2% and petroleum refining by 25%. In the first seven months of the year, 0.5% fewer goods were sold abroad than in the same period of 2022, while 16.4% fewer were sold in Hungary. Industrial production for the year to date is 4.5% lower than in January-July 2022.

Audi to invest Ft 1.5bn in Gyor	Audi Ahead, serving as a regional service centre for the subsidiaries of German automotive group Volkswagen AG, will train around 500 workers from a Ft 1.5 bln (appx EUR 3.9 mln) investment to help prepare for the electric transition of the automotive industry, FM Peter Szijjarto said. He affirmed that the government will contribute Ft 750 mln (appx EUR 1.9 mln) in support. Audi has invested around Ft 4.5 trn (appx EUR 11.6 bln) in Hungary to date, contributing to making the country the 34th largest exporter in the world, he added, recalling that Audi now directly employs more than 12,000 people. The 1.6 million engines and a record 171,000 cars produced in Gyor last year also contributed to the rise in the production value of the automotive industry to beyond the Ft 10 trn (appx EUR 25.8 bln) glass ceiling, with a 31% increase. He said Audi is making a major contribution to the change of dimension of the Hungarian economy from the Made in Hungary to the Invented in Hungary era, as research and development and innovation, which represent higher added value, also play an increasingly important role.
2	CATL to make Shenxing batteries in Debrecen	CATL announced plans to produce its new, fast-charging Shenxing batteries in its facilities in Germany and Hungary, Reuters reports. The Chinese company's chief engineer Gao Pengfei revealed at the IAA auto show in Munich that its newly designed battery will be manufactured at its factories in Thuringa and Debrecen. CATL unveiled Shenxing on August 16, saying the battery can accumulate enough energy to cover a range of 400km in 10 minutes. This new lithium iron phosphate (LFP) battery is expected to enter mass production by the end of 2023 and become commercially available by the beginning of 2024.
ω	KN to build auto parts factory (appx EUR 134 mln)	British-owned GKN Automotive Hungary will build a factory in Felsozsolca, creating 1,500 jobs, with a greenfield investment of Ft 52 bln (appx EUR 134 mln), Foreign Minister Peter Szijjarto announced. The plant will produce parts for BMW, Mercedes-Benz, Suzuki and Volkswagen. According to the minister's statement, the project could create 200 jobs as early as this year, with the completion of the second phase of work, eventually providing 1,500 jobs by the end of 2026. The state will provide subsidies for the investment, the amount of which will be announced later, once the European Commission has given its approval
4	Samsung SDI plans Ft 20bn RnD invest- ment in Hungary (appx EUR 58 mln)	Samsung SDI is to invest Ft 22.5 bln (appx EUR 58 mln) in a research and development operation in Hungary, which will create dozens of high value added jobs, FM Peter Szijjarto said as the South Korean company announced the move. The state is providing Ft 5.5 bln (appx EUR 14.2 mln) in funding for the project, which is the largest ever Research and Development investment in Hungary, the minister emphasised. He said the project will further increase the capacity and safety of new electric batteries, while improving the economics of production. Samsung SDI will in addition further strengthen its co-operation with Hungarian universities, which already provide training in the electric battery and automotive industries.
5	Hungarian seaport to be built by 2026	The government plans to invest EUR 100 million to create a Hungarian-owned deep-sea port and associated logistics centre in Trieste. Hungary bought a 32-hectare plot of land with a 300-metre coastal breakwater in the port of Trieste for EUR 31 million in the summer of 2019, under a 60-year concession contract. The official aim of the investment in Italy is to give Hungarian companies easier access to China and the Middle East and to enable them to export from the Italian port, which is no more than a days drive from Hungary. According to the official announcement, the government expects annual traffic of two million tonnes and 78,000 containers. Plans for the seaport were approved in July, as the port authority has approved the loading of the Hungarian-owned terminal, bringing Hungary one step closer to realising its plans for Trieste. At the same time, the tendering process has started and a decision on who will be awarded the contract is expected soon. In the first phase the winning company will make the canal navigable, and will build a connection to the road network. The long-term plan is to restore maritime trade links to Hungary. Therefore, companies are expected to be able to use the Hungarian terminal of the port of Trieste for their export activities from 2026.

Foreign Minister Peter Szijjarto advocates closer economic links with China for Europe:

Hungary greatly supports even closer economic co-operation between Europe and China, as the separation of the two economies would be a severe blow, Foreign Affairs and Trade Minister Peter Szijjarto declared during a panel discussion at the Belt and Road Summit conference in Hong Kong on 13 Sept. He asserted that the EU is in quite poor shape today, and faces the most severe economic and security challenges in decades. He alleged that Europe has been drawn into a competition with the US about which party will deliver more arms to Ukraine, and described the West's sanctions policy against Russia as a complete fiasco, saying Russia has not been defeated, the fighting is not over and the restrictions do more harm to Europe than to Russia. The EU's competitiveness is deteriorating, as shown by the fact that last year China overtook the community in GDP, he said. The European economic development model has been based on the combination of advanced Western technology and the easily accessible relatively cheap energy from the East, but these links are being severed and some people are advocating the separation of the European and Chinese economies, said Szijjarto. The latter would be tantamount to a knockout blow, he continued, as it would kill the European economy, given that bilateral trade totals EUR 875

billion annually.

- Moody's leaves rating unchanged: Credit-rating agency Moody's left Hungary's Baa2 sovereign rating unchanged and kept the outlook stable. The rating is in the investment grade category, two notches above junk status. Moody's highlighted Hungary's solid medium-term growth outlook and the robust fiscal strength, characterised by a relatively low debt burden. It said "Hungary's greatest weakness is the institutional environment, which worsens its relationship with the EU and makes the use of EU funds uncertain". Moody's expects that the government will eventually secure the majority of its EU funding, although this will be a "step-by-step, noisy process", adding that the potential delay in transfers will have only a minor impact on economic growth and public finances. Moody's also observed that the risks associated with Hungary's dependence on Russian energy imports have decreased compared to 2022. Looking ahead, the rating agency forecasts that Hungary's economy will stagnate in 2023, but that GDP growth will rise to 3% in 2024, supported by returning real wage growth, large foreign investments and expanded export capacity. The budget deficit will be 4.2% of GDP this year, above the government's 3.9% target, falling to 3.5% in 2024, above the official target of 2.9%, while the state debt as a proportion of GDP will be 67.8% of GDP next year, according to Moody's. The report sees inflation falling below 10% before the end of the year then easing further to 3.4% by the end of 2024. A further deterioration of EU relations, lower trend growth, or a reversal of fiscal consolidation could trigger a downgrade, and would be credit negative, the agency warned. Factors that could lead to an upgrade of Hungary's rating include an improvement in the relationship with the EU in combination with progress in the field of the rule of law and the fight against corruption.
- 2. Hungary maintained ban on Ukrainian grain import even after the European Commission's decision for a period of ban on imports of Ukrainian grain to Hungary and four other member states expired on 15 September, along with Slovakia and Poland in defiance of the EC's decision, while Romania and Bulgaria did not protest. Coming into effect in May, the EU allowed the five member states to ban imports of wheat, corn, rapeseed and sunflowers from Ukraine to protect local farmers. Later the Commission decided to lift the ban because it considered that market distortions in the five member states have been eliminated as a result of the measures taken since. However, due to the continued maintaining of the ban, Ukraine decided to sue Hungary, Poland and Slovakia at at the World Trade Organisation. Currently the European Commission is trying to find a solution through negotiations.
- **3. National Bank (MNB) has raised its inflation forecasts while cutting its GDP growth** projections for 2023 and 2024, in its quarterly inflation report. The middle of the forecast range for inflation in 2023 was raised from 17.0% to 17.9%. The MNB envisaged a 0.5% shrinkage of the economy at the lower end of its economic growth forecast for 2023. It also raised the inflation forecast for 2024 to 4-6% from the earlier 3.5-5.5% forecast in June. At the same time, it does not expect such a quick economic rebound as previously, lowering its GDP growth for 2024 to 3-4% from the earlier forecast of 3.5-4.5% in June.

Tariff and Non-Tariff Barriers to Trade:

import Tariffs: The tariff rate on imports averages a comparatively low 1.1% of the value of goods (for international trade), which is the lowest figure regionally and third lowest figure in the whole emerging Europe region. Bosnia's import tariffs are harmonised each year with the combined nomenclature of EU and legislative regulations.

Anti-dumping and countervailing duties: in 2009 Bosnia introduced a law for the protection of domestic products against imports from Croatia and Serbia.

The law stipulates that safeguard measures were necessary owing to the influx of imports and the dumping of particular agricultural products from Croatia and Serbia, as well as a conceivable decrease in exports from Bosnia to Serbia.

Customs and Non-tariff Barriers: as a result of BiH not having EU member status event though the majority of its trading partners are EU member states, export and import supply chains will face more onerous border and documentary times and costs when compared with those of EU states.

The most salient risk is the high cost associated with import border compliance processes, which is higher than that of countries such as North Macedonia and contributes towards Bosnia's status as regional under performer in relation to customs burdens.

Businesses operating in BiH face a high import burden as infrastructural development, industrial capacity and diversification remains weak because of a dearth of fixed capital formation and a lack of political resolve in the country. Imports are driven by the country's need for complex machinery and its energy requirements, such as oil and gas, as well as metals and manufactured goods that cannot be produced locally.

To spur trade, Bosnia has exempted tariff payments from certain equipment that is being imported as part of share capital, with the exceptions of passenger vehicles and slot or gambling machines. To enjoy this benefit, foreign investors must submit a written request to the appropriate customs authority, along with evidence of the investment arrangement and registration of the foreign share. Alternatively, imports into one of Bosnia"s four free trade zones are exempt from customs duties and fees. These zones can be found at Vogosca, Visoko, Mostar and Holc Lukavac and clearly mitigate cost risks for businesses seeking to trade internationally with Bosnia.

Bosnia has applied to join the EU, and accession would open up trade, investment and growth opportunities for the economy. The country has already made good strides in establishing free trade and preliminary agreements to speed up the process of EU accession although, political instability threatens the prospect of EU membership in the medium term. Bosnia is also currently discussing the possibility of the creation of a Western Balkans Customs union with its South eastern-Europe counterparts.

- 1. The International Airport of Sarajevo recorded the number of one million passengers: In the period from January 1 to September 12, 2023, a total of 1,000,373 passengers passed through Sarajevo Airport. This was despite the cancellation of the base of the airline company Wizz Air and the consequent reduction in the number of air operations "This is a clear indication that, with great effort, we have managed to largely maintain the level of the number of passengers from the previous year. Our commitment is to continue positive business and achieve good business results", the Management pointed out.
- **2. Inflation in BIH slows for the ninth month in a row:** Inflation made a further slowdown and in July amounting to 4% on an annual basis. This is the ninth month in a row that the prices of products and services used for personal consumption recorded a decline on an annual basis. On a monthly basis, in July compared to June, inflation recorded a decrease of 0.2%. The highest prices were in food and non-alcoholic beverages, growing by 8.7% in July compared to last year, followed by housing, water, electricity, gas (8.7%), restaurants and hotels (7.7%), other goods and services (9.8%). The main reasons for the drop in prices are transportation services, which are 13.2% *cheaper* on an annual basis, and clothing and footwear and by foodstuffs which are down 5.1%.

Annual inflation in the Federation of BiH fell to 2.8% in July, while in the Republika Srpska it remained at a significantly higher 5.2%. In the first seven months of 2023 compared to the same period last year, inflation in BiH grew by 8.5%, according to data from the BiH Statistics Agency.

1. IMF: Political tensions continue to hamper economic policy and reforms in BiH. On August 30, the Executive Board of the IMF concluded the Article IV consultation with BIH. According to the report made after the visit, the following was observed: Russia's war in Ukraine continues to place significant headwinds on the European economy, with implications for BiH. Moreover, the global tightening of financial conditions is expected to weigh on the country's economic activity. While all new governments have been formed following elections in 2022, political tensions continue to hamper economic policy and reforms. The EU candidacy status, granted in December 2022, has yet to create reform momentum. Economic growth declined to 3.9 % in 2022 from 7.4% in 2021 and is projected to decelerate further to 2% this year on weaker domestic and external demand. Inflation peaked at 17.4% in October 2022 and has since been on a declining trend but remains elevated. In line with falling international food and energy prices, average inflation is projected to fall to 6% in 2023. Downside risks are high and include a possible abrupt slowdown in Europe, an intensification of domestic political tensions, and the materialization of financial risks. The fiscal stance improved in 2022 as the overall fiscal surplus increased to 0.9% of GDP from 0.6% in 2021. A surge in current spending reflecting measures to mitigate the cost-of-living crisis was accompanied by a smaller increase in capital spending. Total government debt declined below 30% of GDP in 2022, also because of slow project disbursement and implementation. With expenditures rising faster than revenues, the fiscal balance is expected to turn to a deficit of 1.5% of GDP in 2023. Financing needs have increased in 2023 given large debt repayments. of structural reforms to accelerate growth, promote green and digital transition, and raise living standards. They called for accelerating governance reforms and encouraged the authorities to request an IMF governance diagnostic to help identify key weaknesses and prioritize reforms. Directors also encouraged the authorities to urgently adopt a new anti-money laundering law and prioritize the implementation of the anti-corruption legal frameworks. Continuing efforts to strengthen public enterprise oversight and transparency also remain important. On the climate front, they recommended stepping up efforts to decarbonize the economy, coupling the electricity market with the EU market, and transitioning to renewables, stated the IMF Resident Representative Office in BiH.
