Overview of General Barriers to FDI in Hungary:

Regulatory barriers and administrative burden are affecting all sectors but particularly energy, construction, and banking: The overall administrative burden, including start-ups, negatively affects investment decisions. The instability of the regulatory framework, with frequent and unpredictable regulatory changes, creates uncertainty for investors and is hindering both internal investment and FDIs.

The Hungarian government imposes a 100% offset requirement for defined sector investments over HUF 1bln (EUR 2.8 mln). Efficiency of procedures in construction and environmental permits is insufficient; corruption also raises risk for investors. There is no requirement that investors must purchase from local sources, but the EU Rules of origin applies.

Ownership restrictions (all non-EU)

according to the 2014 Land Law, only private Hungarian or EU citizens resident in Hungary with a minimum of three years experience of working in agriculture or holding degree in agriculture can purchase farmland, which is limited to 300 hectares. All others may lease farmland. All farmland purchases must be approved by a local land committee and Hungarian authorities, local farmers and young farmers must be offered a chance to purchase the land first. Up to 1200 hectares for a maximum of 20 years may be leased.

Price controls in consumer facing sectors and others considered to be of strategic importance.

The Hungarian government regulates the prices of certain goods, setting the upper and lower limits to which the private sector must adhere. Sectors include energy, pharmaceuticals. Cuts on regulated utilities prices have put considerable pressure on private utilities companies, decreasing profit margins and adding to an increasingly difficult operating environment.

State intervention in Banking, energy, agriculture, media, telecommunications, and retail sectors.

Since 2012 government has invested in state-owned enterprises with the objective of lessening the participation of foreign-owned competitors, especially in the energy sector. From 1 Jan 2019, the chemical industry, the telecom sector, vehicle construction, metallurgy, optics and electric equipment production, the defence industry, water and sewage management, the financial sector, food industry and agriculture, production of construction materials, state administration, health care, wage management, transport and tourism sectors have been added. Foreign investors in the targeted sectors have expressed concerns that the tax regime has become unpredictable and the additional levies appear to have been aimed against some industries with a high level of foreign ownership.

Basic Rules of The Protection of Strategic assets Concerning Foreign investments

The European Commission has issued Communication 2020/C 99 i/01 in which it has given guidance to the Member States of the EU concerning the protection of Europe's strategic assets from the foreign direct investment, ahead of the application of Regulation (EU) 2019/452 (FDI Screening Regulation) which is applicable from 11 October 2020.Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/1298 of 13 July 2020 amended the Annex to Regulation (EU) 2019/452.

Hungary first adopted FDI screening mechanisms by act LVII of 2018 for FDIs violating the security interests of the country, then in the economic crisis caused by COVID-19, further screening rules were adopted for FDIs by Government Decree nr. 227/2020. (V.25.). According to the above, certain transactions concerning Hungarian-seated companies operated in strategic sectors by foreign investors shall be reported to the Minister of Finance and the acknowledgement of the Minister of Finance is necessary for the realisation of the acquisition of the shares until 31 December 2020. These transactions include the acquisition of shares, the increase of the registered capital and the transformation of the company. The strategic sectors specified by the Government Decree include energy, communication, finance, agriculture and food industry, healthcare, construction, transport industry, tourism, IT, mechanical engineering, etc. Those foreign investors that have shares in a company registered in the EU, European economic Community or in Switzerland shall only report the transaction if majority interest will be acquired indirectly. Conversely, the foreign investors wishing to acquire shares in a Hungarian company directly have to report any transactions by which the foreign investor would acquire shares at a ratio of at least 10% and the value of the investment is at least 350 000 000 HUF (appx EUR 1 mln). The Minister of Finance has 45 days or in specific and duly justified cases 60 days to decide on the acknowledgement of the transaction. Should the Minister provide a negative decision, then the exact reason of the prohibition is not required to be mentioned. Aggrieved investor may appeal before The metropolitan Court for a review of the prohibiting decision.

On 23rd June 2025 a revised decree came into force introducing two key changes to the earlier framework.

1.) The deadline for administrative review has been extended from 30 days to 45.

2.) The competent minister may request up to three extensions of 30 working days each, provided the request is submitted in writing before the original deadline passes. Should the minister block a transaction, the state, barring certain exceptions, has 90 days to exercise its pre-emptive right to acquire the targeted firm on the terms outlined in the original agreement. The amended rules also apply retroactively to transactions currently under review.

Banking, agriculture, defence and energy

The Hungarian government has publicly declared that reducing foreign bank market share in the Hungarian financial sector and tightening regulations governing NGOs are key priority areas. Several state-led initiatives over the past several years targeted the banking sector and reduced foreign participation.

- 1. Inflation on hold at 4.3%: Consumer prices were up 4.3% year-on-year in October for the fourth straight month, a rate slightly below forecasts, and were unchanged from the previous month for the third consecutive month, the Central Statistics Office (KSH) said.. Core inflation, which better reflects underlying price pressures, increased from 3.9% to 4.2%, above the high end of the MNB's 4.0% tolerance band. Inflation is expected to fall below 4% by year's end and could temporarily dip below 3% early next year, due to further administrative measures and the low base according to analysts.
- 2. Net wages up 10% in September: Gross wages of full-time employees were up 9.5% yr/yr to Ft 687,100 in September, while net earnings expanded by 10% to Ft 475,100, the KSH said. The median gross wage was Ft 568,700, while the median net earning was Ft 397,400, yr/yr increases of 10.4% and 11.1%, respectively. Higher tax allowances in effect from July lifted net wages and real wage growth, with a 4.3% inflation rate for the month, reached 5.5%. The average gross wage in the business sector, including state-owned companies, rose by 8.8% to Ft 684,600.. Public-sector pay rose further, gaining 12.4% to Ft 743,000.
- **3. EC trims Hungary's growth outlook**: After two years of muted expansion, Hungary's economy is now expected to grow by only 0.4% in 2025, down from the 0.8% projected in the spring, according to the

European Commission's latest forecast. Growth is put at 2.3% for 2026, down from 2.5%, and is forecast to ease to 2.1% in 2027. The inflation forecast for 2025 was increased from 4.1% envisaged in the spring to 4.5%, and from 3.3% to 3.6% for 2026.

	1.	Samsung SDI expansion draws heavy state backing	Samsung SDI is enlarging the capacity of its EV battery plant in God with an investment of Ft 955 bln, assisted by Ft 133 bln in state support. Samsung SDI has already benefited from state assistance on five occasions through similar decisions. Samsung opened its first Hungarian plant in 2017, followed by a much larger second facility adjacent to it completed after 2019. An expansion of the second unit began in early 2024 and is still under way; the newly signed contract applies to this phase. The expanded section will supply batteries to Hyundai from 2026. Further enlargement remains possible.

BYD delays opening of Szeged factory to mid 2026	BYD Executive Vice-President Stella Li has confirmed that the new car plant in Szeged will begin production in the second quarter of 2026, not in 2025, as initially planned. The announcement was made at a press event in Zhengzhou, where the carmaker is building a vast production hub, ten times the size of Teslas Gigafactory in China, that will operate much like a self-contained city.

Vulcan Shield Global to start hiring	Singapore-based Vulcan Shield Global plans to set up its local unit by end of the year and start hiring staff in early 2026 for its new factory in Bekescsaba, with an EUR 700 mln investment in three phases, creating 2,500 jobs. The company will produce advanced ceramic and aluminium-fibre materials for the automotive, aerospace, electronics, and other high-tech sectors, said CEO David Kneale. The government supported the project with a Ft 50 bln grant. Production is expected to start with a small staff in the summer of 2026 after the arrival of machinery, with headcount to rise to 100-200 once the factory goes online. The company plans to build a long-term, locally rooted operation, relying on regional suppliers, subcontractors, and workforce. The project has been designated a priority investment by the government, ensuring faster administrative processing and approvals.

Paks II receives key permit for nuclear block construction, US announces sanctions exemption	The Nuclear Authority OAH has granted a partial commissioning permit for ground consolidation works on the nuclear Block 5 at the Paks expansion project, officially Block 1 of the new plant. The permit, allows the builders to begin pouring concrete, the stage at which the project is formally recognised as a nuclear power plant under construction by international standards. Earlier progress was delayed after cracks appeared in the pit wall in November 2024, followed by a collapse on January 30, 2025 resulting in a suspension of the permit. After repairs and safety inspections were completed, the authority allowed work to resume in mid-June, enabling the continuation of the licensing process that has now resulted in the newly issued permit. The US Office of Foreign Assets Control OFAC released a document confirming that the Paks 2 nuclear power project will be exempt from US anti-Russia sanctions. The licence lists 13 banks through which transactions linked to the investment may proceed, including Gazprombank, the Russian central bank, Vneshekonombank and Sberbank, which was forced to close its Hungarian arm in 2022. The exemption is limited. US banks must still refrain from crediting any amount to the Russian central bank, the Russian National Wealth Fund or the Finance Ministry. The OFAC document sets no expiry date for the authorisation.

- 1. Gov't prolongs retail margin cap, widens product list: The government has extended the cap on retail margins for food and drugstore goods for a further three months, pushing its expiry to February 28, 2026 from the end of November, according to a decree. From December 1, the scope of the regulation will expand to include beef tenderloin and sirloin, pork liver and liver pâté, as well as semi-hard, cream and spreadable cheeses. The list also includes apples, pears, plums and grapes, alongside vegetables such as cabbage, tomatoes, onions and green peppers. Baby formula is likewise brought under the margin restriction.
- 2. Hungary to join Voyager's space station project: Hungary is preparing an investment, education, training and technology co-operation agreement with the US-based Voyager Technologies, opening the way for participation in the company's space station construction programme, Foreign Affairs and Trade Minister Peter Szijjarto said. Voyager Technologies plans to build and launch a commercially operated space station into Earth's orbit by 2029. Zhe partnership would enable Hungary to take an active role in the station's construction, technological development and future operations.

Tariff and Non-Tariff Barriers to Trade:

Import Tariffs: The tariff rate on imports averages a comparatively low 1.1% of the value of goods (for international trade), which is the lowest figure regionally and third lowest figure in the whole emerging Europe region. Bosnia's import tariffs are harmonised each year with the combined nomenclature of EU and legislative regulations.

Anti-dumping and countervailing duties: in 2009 Bosnia introduced a law for the protection of domestic products against imports from Croatia and Serbia.

The law stipulates that safeguard measures were necessary owing to the influx of imports and the dumping of particular agricultural products from Croatia and Serbia, as well as a conceivable decrease in exports from Bosnia to Serbia.

Customs and Non-tariff Barriers: as a result of BiH not having EU member status event though the majority of its trading partners are EU member states, export and import supply chains will face more onerous border and documentary times and costs when compared with those of EU states.

The most salient risk is the high cost associated with import border compliance processes, which is higher than that of countries such as North Macedonia and contributes towards Bosnia's status as regional under performer in relation to customs burdens.

Businesses operating in BiH face a high import burden as infrastructural development, industrial capacity and diversification remains weak because of a dearth of fixed capital formation and a lack of political resolve in the country. Imports are driven by the country's need for complex machinery and its energy requirements, such as oil and gas, as well as metals and manufactured goods that cannot be produced locally.

To spur trade, Bosnia has exempted tariff payments from certain equipment that is being imported as part of share capital, with the exceptions of passenger vehicles and slot or gambling machines. To enjoy this benefit, foreign investors must submit a written request to the appropriate customs authority, along with evidence of the investment arrangement and registration of the foreign share. Alternatively, imports into one of Bosnia's four free trade zones are exempt from customs duties and fees. These zones can be found at Vogosca.

Visoko, Mostar and Holc Lukavac and clearly mitigate cost risks for businesses seeking to trade internationally with Bosnia.

Bosnia has applied to join the EU, and accession would open up trade, investment and growth opportunities for the economy. The country has already made good strides in establishing free trade and preliminary agreements to speed up the process of EU accession although, political instability threatens the prospect of EU membership in the medium term. Bosnia is also currently discussing the possibility of the creation of a Western Balkans Customs union with its South eastern-Europe counterparts.

- 1. Industrial Production Increased by 3.2%: Seasonally adjusted industrial production in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina (FBiH) in October 2025 compared to September 2025 increased by 3.2%. According to the statistics in October 2025, compared to October 2024, production of Energy was 22.9% higher, and capital Goods was 9.9% higher. Durable consumer goods were 21.3% lower, Non-durable consumer goods were 6.4% lower, and Intermediate goods were 1.7% lower.
- **2. Price Level Growth by 4.3%:** The prices of products and services used for personal consumption in Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH), measured by the consumer price index, in October 2025 compared to the previous month were 0.4% higher on average. On a yr/yr basis the price level in October 2025 compared to the same

month of 2024 was higher by 4.3%. Food and non-alcoholic beverages increased by 6.9%, Alcoholic beverages and tobacco by 3.8%, Housing and overhead expenses grew by 5.2%, Furniture, household appliances and regular home maintenance by 1.8%, Health increased by 5.5%, communications by 1.7%, Recreation and culture by 4.7%, Education by 3.3%, Restaurant and hotel prices grew by 7.8% while prices of Other goods and services increased by 2.5%. On the other hand, clothing and Footwear section became cheaper by 8.2%.

		Pavgord Group, which recently took over production at the coke Plant, is at risk. President of the Federal Trade Union, Ilvana Smajlovic, said, the current situation in the coke Plant is worrying. The reason is insufficient quantities of coal to start a large number of furnaces, due to the unwilling attitude of the FBiH Railways to deliver a minimum amount of coal from the Port of Ploce, but also since it completely blocks the shipment of the produced coke, Smajlovic stated. This is due to the fact that the coke Plant owes the FBiH Railways more than eight million KM. The position of the FBiH Railways calls into question further production at the coke Plant, which is disastrous for the company and which also blocks the beginning of the recovery process. She emphasized that the Zenica Iron and Steel Plants operations are also threatened by the current position of the FBiH Railways, blockading the transport, because they are not being supplied with coke in the necessary quantities. She appealed to all stakeholders to prevent the worst possible scenario, which is for the collapse of the coke plant.
2.	ArcelorMittal announces sale of Bosnian operations	ArcelorMittal has recently signed a sale and purchase agreement to sell its operations in Bosnia and Herzegovina. ArcelorMittal Zenica, an integrated steel plant, and ArcelorMittal Prijedor, an iron ore mining business which supplies the Zenica plant, will be sold to Pavgord Group. The company has made considerable investments and efforts to keep ArcelorMittal Zenica and ArcelorMittal Prijedor within the group. However, after a thorough strategic review, the company concluded that a sale is the best solution for the development of the business and its people. Under the terms of the transaction, ArcelorMittals shares in ArcelorMittal Zenica and ArcelorMittal Prijedor will be sold to Pavgord Group, and all employees jobs are transferred to the new owner. The deal is expected to close around the end of 2025, subject to merger control clearance and the fulfilment of all conditions precedent.

- 1. The average monthly net salary per employee in Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) for September 2025 was 1,585 KM, a nominal growth of 0.4%, and 0.2% higher in real terms compared to August 2025. On an annual basis, the average net salary in September 2025 compared to the same month last year was nominally 14.7% higher, and the real index was 10.1% higher, according to data from the BiH Agency for Statistics. The highest net salaries were earned by employees in the information and communication sector, 2,174 KM, followed by financial and insurance activities, 2,026 KM, in health and social protection activities, 2,007 KM, and in the production and supply of electricity, gas, steam and air conditioning, 1,976 KM. The lowest net earnings were in the accommodation and food service activities in the amount of 1,146 KM, and in construction 1,263 KM. The average gross salary of employees in September this year was 2,461 KM, which is a nominal increase of 0.5%, and in real terms it is 0.3% higher compared to August this year. The average gross salary in September 2025 compared to the same month last year was nominally higher by 15%, with the real index higher by 10.4%.
