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Overview of General Barriers to FDI in Hungary:

Regulatory barriers and administrative burden are affecting all sectors but particularly energy, construction, and banking: The overall administrative burden, including start-ups, negatively affects investment decisions. The instability of the regulatory framework, with frequent and unpredictable regulatory changes, creates uncertainty for investors and is hindering both internal investment and FDIs.

The Hungarian government imposes a 100% offset requirement for defined sector investments over HUF 1bln (EUR 2.8 mln). Efficiency of procedures in construction and environmental permits is insufficient; corruption also raises risk for investors. There is no requirement that investors must purchase from local sources, but the EU Rules of origin applies.

Ownership restrictions (all non-EU)

according to the 2014 Land Law, only private Hungarian or EU citizens resident in Hungary with a minimum of three years experience of working in agriculture or holding degree in agriculture can purchase farmland, which is limited to 300 hectares. All others may lease farmland. All farmland purchases must be approved by a local land committee and Hungarian authorities, local farmers and young farmers must be offered a chance to purchase the land first. Up to 1200 hectares for a maximum of 20 years may be leased.

Price controls in consumer facing sectors and others considered to be of strategic importance.

The Hungarian government regulates the prices of certain goods, setting the upper and lower limits to which the private sector must adhere. Sectors include energy, pharmaceuticals. Cuts on regulated utilities prices have put considerable pressure on private utilities companies, decreasing profit margins and adding to an increasingly difficult operating environment.

State intervention in Banking, energy, agriculture, media, telecommunications, and retail sectors.

Since 2012 government has invested in state-owned enterprises with the objective of lessening the participation of foreign-owned competitors, especially in the energy sector. From 1 Jan 2019, the chemical industry, the telecom sector, vehicle construction, metallurgy, optics and electric equipment production, the defence industry, water and sewage management, the financial sector, food industry and agriculture, production of construction materials, state administration, health care, wage management, transport and tourism sectors have been added. Foreign investors in the targeted sectors have expressed concerns that the tax regime has become unpredictable and the additional levies appear to have been aimed against some industries with a high level of foreign ownership.

Basic Rules of The Protection of Strategic assets Concerning Foreign investments

The European Commission has issued Communication 2020/C 99 i/01 in which it has given guidance to the Member States of the EU concerning the protection of Europe's strategic assets from the foreign direct investment, ahead of the application of Regulation (EU) 2019/452 (FDI Screening Regulation) which is applicable from 11 October 2020.Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/1298 of 13 July 2020 amended the Annex to Regulation (EU) 2019/452.

Hungary first adopted FDI screening mechanisms by act LVII of 2018 for FDIs violating the security interests of the country, then in the economic crisis caused by COVID-19, further screening rules were adopted for FDIs by Government Decree nr. 227/2020. (V.25.). According to the above, certain transactions concerning Hungarian-seated companies operated in strategic sectors by foreign investors shall be reported to the Minister of Finance and the acknowledgement of the Minister of Finance is necessary for the realisation of the acquisition of the shares until 31 December 2020. These transactions include the acquisition of shares, the increase of the registered capital and the transformation of the company. The strategic sectors specified by the Government Decree include energy, communication, finance, agriculture and food industry, healthcare, construction, transport industry, tourism, IT, mechanical engineering, etc. Those foreign investors that have shares in a company registered in the EU, European economic Community or in Switzerland shall only report the transaction if majority interest will be acquired indirectly. Conversely, the foreign investors wishing to acquire shares in a Hungarian company directly have to report any transactions by which the foreign investor would acquire shares at a ratio of at least 10% and the value of the investment is at least 350 000 000 HUF (appx EUR 1 mln). The Minister of Finance has 45 days or in specific and duly justified cases 60 days to decide on the acknowledgement of the transaction. Should the Minister provide a negative decision, then the exact reason of the prohibition is not required to be mentioned. Aggrieved investor may appeal before The Metropolitan Court for a review of the prohibiting decision.

Banking, agriculture, defence and energy

The Hungarian government has publicly declared that reducing foreign bank market share in the Hungarian financial sector and tightening regulations governing NGOs are key priority areas. Several state-led initiatives over the past several years targeted the banking sector and reduced foreign participation.

- 1. Industrial output was down 3.8% year-on-year in June and 6.1% lower when adjusted for working days, according to preliminary data from the Central Statistics Office (KSH) said.. On a monthly basis, output contracted by 0.9% in the month after a spike in May. Most branches of manufacturing experienced a decline, but sectors with the highest weight performed well. Analysts say industrial output has been dragged down by lower production from energy companies and the weak performance of energy-intensive sectors. A rise in the vehicle and electrical equipment sectors, producing mainly for export, could not offset the decline in segments producing mainly for the domestic market, which struggled to the absence of demand, analysts added. The moderation of inflation and the recovery of purchasing power projected in the autumn provides some positive impetus to the domestic sectors, but the sector will fall short of output levels in 2022, analysts said.
- **2. Annual inflation dropped to 17.6% for July** still the highest in the EU down from 20.1% in June the KSH siad. Prices rose by only 0.3% from June, indicating that the annual inflation rate could fall below 10% as early as the late autumn months. There were year-on-year increases of 35.7% in household energy prices and 23.1% in food prices, on average, while "other items" including fuel, household appliances and pharmaceuticals rose by 17.2% on average. Services rose by 14.6%, clothes by 8% and consumer durables by 3.6%. Analysts expect average inflation to be 17.5% this year and to moderate to 3.9% next year.
- 3. Construction industry struggling to survive: The construction industry's order book was 30% smaller at the end of the first half of 2023 compared to the middle of last year, with the volume of new contracts signed this year 37% below the volume of contracts signed in the first half of 2022, according to the construction companies association Evosz. The combination of a cutback in public orders, amounting to Ft 3 trn, (appx EUR 7.7 bln) a 25% decline in housing construction and renovation, and foreign investors' use of imported materials, non-EU labour and contractor capacity have resulted in the critical situation, which may lead to job cuts. Evosz said many construction companies, design and engineering firms will not get enough work for the rest of the year. Radical cost reductions are necessary for the majority of construction companies, it said, which may entail downsizing with the low point coming in 2024.

Liberty Steel Group plans to switch to green steel production at Dunaferr	Current management and the liquidator deiced to temporarily shut down blast furnace No. 2 and to reduce the coking plant operations to a minimum technological level, due to the challenging market conditions in Europe. Also executives stressed that the aim is to make the ironworks operations sustainable and fit for a green future for the benefit of all concerned, once the relevant EU regulatory approval has been obtained. Liberty Steel also reassured workers that salaries are being paid while appropriate retraining and upskilling programmes are being developed. The planned shutdown of the blast furnace is expected to last for three months. The steelworks has also shut down with the hot-rolling mill to be shut down intermittently following the roll-out of the currently available stock. The senior executives said they agree with the liquidator and the companys management that the company must be prepared to effectively manage the extremely challenging European market conditions. The situation is characterized by high levels of foreign steel imports into the EU and high energy prices, which are only exacerbated by the additional costs of meeting EU carbon emissions requirements

From the Indian side, delegates from from the Ministry of Commerce & Industry, New Delhi, ICAR, and Ministry of Information Technology (MeITY) as well as representative from the Embassy of Hungary, New Delhi joined. From the Hungarian side also there were representatives from various departments and concerned institutions. The discussions were completed in a friendly and congenial atmosphere. Both sides agreed on the need to further deepen cooperation in areas of mutual interest. Followed by a brief panel discussion between the two sides, the final Protocol was signed by H.E. Mr. Peter Sztaray, State Secretary for Security Policy and Energy Security, Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade and Mr. Rajendra Ratnoo, Joint Secretary, DPIIT on 18th October 2022. The Indian delegation met with investors and some members of the Indian business community in Hungary on the evening on 17th October. Mr. Ratnoo give a brief overview of the business environment in India, the policy initiatives of the Government of India and the economic growth and prospects of India. He mentioned several schemes open for investors to take advantage of in India like the Make in India initiative, Smart Cities, New Logistics Policy, Atma Nirbhar Bharat, PM Ghati Shakti, productivity Linked incentive schemes etc. The delegation also had a meeting with HIPA on 18th afternoon where they discussed ideas how to enhance investments and promote cooperation between the two countries.

- 1. Hungary in longest recession in 20 years: Economic output in the second quarter fell far short of analysts' projections, as GDP was down 2.4% year-on-year, and shrank by 0.3% from the previous quarter, the KSH said in a preliminary estimate. Analysts expected results to show a 1.3% fall on a yearly basis and 0.3% growth on a quarterly basis. The fourth consecutive quarterly contraction constitutes the longest recession since the KSH began using its current methodology in 1995. The annualised data was the weakest since the end of 2020, the first year of the pandemic. The workday-adjusted GDP was 2.3% lower, year-on-year. First-half GDP was 1.7% lower than in the first six months of 2022. On an annual basis, the Hungarian economy was the third-worst performer in the EU. The KSH said in a short note that industry and market-based services, mainly transport, warehousing and trade, contributed to the overall decline, which was moderated by the good performance of the agriculture sector. Following the data release, analysts lowered their economic growth projections for 2023 and said the government's 1.5% target looks increasingly unrealistic, and recession for the full year seems inevitable.
- 2. Passenger traffic rising at Liszt Ferenc Airport: Passenger traffic at Liszt Ferenc International Airport reached nearly 1.5 mln in July, operator Budapest Airport announced. According to the statement, 8.2 mln passengers were served between January and July, 24% more than in the same period in 2022 and more than in the whole of 2021. July was the fifth month in a row in which passenger numbers exceeded one mln. The number of passengers registered so far this year is 9.2% below the record year of 2019, and it is expected that the total annual passenger traffic will exceed 14.3 mln. If this trend continues, a full recovery of pre-pandemic passenger numbers is expected by the end of 2024. Air freight volumes in the first seven months of the year were 4.7% down on the same period last year, but the 16,390 tonnes handled in July were some 12% up on the same period of 2022. Based on the 107,000 tonnes of air cargo handled so far in 2023, the airport can expect another record year. Budapest Airport said the development of BUD Cargo City will allow it to handle up to 300,000 tonnes of cargo per year.

Tariff and Non-Tariff Barriers to Trade:

import Tariffs: The tariff rate on imports averages a comparatively low 1.1% of the value of goods (for international trade), which is the lowest figure regionally and third lowest figure in the whole emerging Europe region. Bosnia's import tariffs are harmonised each year with the combined nomenclature of EU and legislative regulations.

Anti-dumping and countervailing duties: in 2009 Bosnia introduced a law for the protection of domestic products against imports from Croatia and Serbia.

The law stipulates that safeguard measures were necessary owing to the influx of imports and the dumping of particular agricultural products from Croatia and Serbia, as well as a conceivable decrease in exports from Bosnia to Serbia.

Customs and Non-tariff Barriers: as a result of BiH not having EU member status event though the majority of its trading partners are EU member states, export and import supply chains will face more onerous border and documentary times and costs when compared with those of EU states.

The most salient risk is the high cost associated with import border compliance processes, which is higher than that of countries such as North Macedonia and contributes towards Bosnia's status as regional under performer in relation to customs burdens.

Businesses operating in BiH face a high import burden as infrastructural development, industrial capacity and diversification remains weak because of a dearth of fixed capital formation and a lack of political resolve in the country. Imports are driven by the country's need for complex machinery and its energy requirements, such as oil and gas, as well as metals and manufactured goods that cannot be produced locally.

To spur trade, Bosnia has exempted tariff payments from certain equipment that is being imported as part of share capital, with the exceptions of passenger vehicles and slot or gambling machines. To enjoy this benefit, foreign investors must submit a written request to the appropriate customs authority, along with evidence of the investment arrangement and registration of the foreign share. Alternatively, imports into one of Bosnia's four free trade zones are exempt from customs duties and fees. These zones can be found at Vogosca, Visoko, Mostar and Holc Lukavac and clearly mitigate cost risks for businesses seeking to trade internationally with Bosnia.

Bosnia has applied to join the EU, and accession would open up trade, investment and growth opportunities for the economy. The country has already made good strides in establishing free trade and preliminary agreements to speed up the process of EU accession although, political instability threatens the prospect of EU membership in the medium term. Bosnia is also currently discussing the possibility of the creation of a Western Balkans Customs union with its South eastern-Europe counterparts.

- 1. Economic growth in BiH in the next three years expected to be around 3%: According to the projections of the Directorate for Economic Planning (DEP), in the period 2023-2026 economic growth can be expected with an average rate of about 3% on an annual basis. The main driver of this growth should be domestic demand through an increase in private consumption and, to a lesser extent, investments. DEP estimates that the average annual economic growth rate in 2024 could amount to 2.7%, in 2025 3% and in 2026 3.3%. In the period 2023 -2026, both in BiH and in the world, a gradual stabilization of economic conditions is expected, which will be reflected in the volume of production, employment and exports. Industrial production in BiH will, in addition to economic trends, also depend on the implementation of reform measures to improve the business environment. inflation in BiH is expected to reach 3.1% in 2024 and 2.2% in 2025. and 1.9% in 2026.
- 2. Republika Srpska B credit rating is maintained with a stable outlook: In its report Standard & Poor's (S&P) states that the economy of the Republika Srpska functions in complex political and financial arrangements, burdened by political tensions that harm the economy and lead to slowness in reforms, but the Republika Srpska compensates for this, as they state, with strong autonomy in the management of its fiscal policies, while to which it is stated that there is a noticeable trend of greater transparency of public administration in the RS. "We look positively at the existence of the upper limit of the Government's debt and the annual deficit, as well as the relatively high level of publication of the central government's budget and debt. The debt of the RS cannot exceed the limit of 60% of GDP, while the deficit must be within 3% of GDP", the report states and notes that the Government publishes its biggest strategies and framework budget documents, as well as monthly financial reports, on its website. As one of the biggest challenges facing Republika Srpska, Standard & Poor's agency cites demographic challenges, which could represent additional pressure on the budget in the long term.
