Economy news highlights of Equatorial Guinea:

(1) The Vice President is seeking alternative solutions for Bata's unfinished social projects:

SE Nguema Obiang Mangue met again at the People's Palace in Malabo with members of the Multi-sectoral Commission in-charge of monitoring these social works, along with political leaders from the Bata district, as part of a broader national strategy aimed at strengthening basic infrastructure and improving the quality of life for citizens.

Among the priorities identified are the rehabilitation of urban and rural roads, sustainable access to drinking water, stability in the supply of electricity and the restoration of administrative buildings that are in an advanced state of deterioration, the latter mainly due to the explosions of 7M. A central role in this endeavor is played by the Vice President of the Republic, in charge of Defense and State Security, who leads the multisectoral commission established to monitor, control, and hand over these projects to the government. Under his coordination, the commission has intensified technical inspection visits, assessed the current status of the projects, and promoted corrective measures to reactivate stalled or abandoned work. His leadership has fostered an integrated vision that coordinates the efforts of the various ministries and implementing agencies, facilitating swift and effective decision-making.

(2) Equatorial Guinea advocates for Peace Diplomacy and condemns the use of unilateral coercive economic measures at the UN:

During his speech at the United Nations General Assembly, Juan Mbomio Ndong Mangue, representing the delegation of Equatorial Guinea, strongly condemned the use of unilateral coercive economic measures. According to Ndong Mangue, these sanctions not only undermine the established international order but also constitute violations of the UN Charter and international law. In expressing this rejection, he emphasized that the sanctions disproportionately affect the most vulnerable nations, weakening their economies and hindering their development.

The Counselor at the Permanent Mission of Equatorial Guinea to the UN in New York indicated that these improper actions disrupt the balance of trade and generate tensions, distancing countries from the international cooperation necessary to address contemporary global challenges. This position aligns with that of the African Group, the Non-Aligned Movement, the Group of Friends in Defense of the Charter of the United Nations, and the G77 + China Group, all of whom have also spoken out against these practices. Through its active participation in the United Nations General Assembly, Equatorial Guinea seeks to promote an approach that prioritizes dialogue and cooperation over coercive measures. The Equatorial Guinean delegation emphasized that building a fairer and more balanced international environment is imperative for achieving sustainable development.
