1.				Strict Bio Security norms make export of food grains and other such items to New Zealand very difficult. The suggested measures after detection of pests in a consignment are not cost effective. There are three options given to the importers: (i) Send back the consignment or (ii) Go for complete fumigation or (iii) Destroy the whole shipment. However, major importers like Yogi Ji, Patel Brothers, Indo-Kiwi, and others have successfully brought Indian food products, hair oils, and ayurvedic/ herbal items to New Zealand, where they are widely sold and appreciated.
2.				The Ministry of Primary Industries (MPI) enforces controls on imported goods to ensure that no unwanted pests or diseases enter the country and that food remains safe to eat. Guidelines for the import of almost all types of commodities have been prescribed and are mandatory. Customs clearance is not overly difficult or cumbersome, provided the consignment complies with the prescribed procedures. On 22 December 2025, India and New Zealand concluded a landmark FTA, eliminating or reducing tariffs on around 95% of New Zealand exports, with over half becoming duty-free from day one. The agreement delivers major gains for key goods and services sectors and is expected to significantly boost exports, jobs, and bilateral trade growth.</p>

3.	Trade Promotion	On 19 December 2025, High Commissioner met Ms. Annie Murray, CEO & Mr. Chris Payne, Head of Co-Production, NZ Film Commission. The discussions focussed on future collaborations including screening of Indian films, collaboration on film festivals & working together on projects under the India-NZ co-production treaty.
4.	Trade Promotion	On 22 December 2025, New Zealand and India concluded a landmark Free Trade Agreement, providing New Zealand exporters unprecedented access to India's 1.4 billion consumers. Trade and Investment Minister Todd McClay said the agreement eliminated or reduced tariffs on 95 percent of New Zealand exports, with 57 percent duty-free from day one, rising to 82 percent over time. The agreement delivered immediate gains for key sectors including sheep meat, wool, forestry, seafood, horticulture, wine, mānuka honey, and selected dairy products, while expanding services access and protecting geographical indications. The FTA was expected to support thousands of jobs, significantly lift exports, and accelerate progress toward New Zealand's goal of doubling export value over 10 years. PM Christopher Luxon also welcomed the conclusion of the India–New Zealand Free Trade Agreement, calling it a landmark achievement for New Zealand. He said the agreement was delivered just nine months after negotiations were launched with Narendra Modi, following sustained ministerial and leader-level engagement. The Prime Minister noted that tariffs were removed immediately on more than half of New Zealand's exports to India, creating major opportunities for jobs, exports, and growth.

The discussions focussed on future collaborations including screening of Indian films, collaboration on film festivals & working together on projects under the India-NZ co-production treaty.
4.	-Trade -22 December 2025 -Wellington	On 22 December 2025, New Zealand and India concluded a landmark Free Trade Agreement, providing New Zealand exporters unprecedented access to India's 1.4 billion consumers. Trade and Investment Minister Todd McClay said the agreement eliminated or reduced tariffs on 95 percent of New Zealand exports, with 57 percent duty-free from day one, rising to 82 percent over time. The agreement delivered immediate gains for key sectors including sheep meat, wool, forestry, seafood, horticulture, wine, mānuka honey, and selected dairy products, while expanding services access and protecting geographical indications. The FTA was expected to support thousands of jobs, significantly lift exports, and accelerate progress toward New Zealand's goal of doubling export value over 10 years. PM Christopher Luxon also welcomed the conclusion of the India–New Zealand Free Trade Agreement, calling it a landmark achievement for New Zealand. He said the agreement was delivered just nine months after negotiations were launched with Narendra Modi, following sustained ministerial and leader-level engagement. The Prime Minister noted that tariffs were removed immediately on more than half of New Zealand's exports to India, creating major opportunities for jobs, exports, and growth.
