1.				Strict Bio Security norms make export of food grains and other such items to New Zealand very difficult. The suggested measures after detection of pests in a consignment are not cost effective. There are three options given to the importers: (i) Send back the consignment or (ii) Go for complete fumigation or (iii) Destroy the whole shipment. However, major importers like Yogi Ji, Patel Brothers, Indo-Kiwi, and others have successfully brought Indian food products, hair oils, and ayurvedic/ herbal items to New Zealand, where they are widely sold and appreciated.
2.				The Ministry of Primary Industries (MPI) enforces controls on imported goods to ensure that no unwanted pests or diseases enter the country and that food remains safe to eat. Guidelines for the import of almost all types of commodities have been prescribed and are mandatory. Customs clearance is not overly difficult or cumbersome, provided the consignment complies with the prescribed procedures. The required procedures and documentation are readily available on

1.	Trade Promotion	<p>CIM Mr. Piyush Goyal visited New Zealand from 5–7 November 2025. This was the first official visit by India’s Commerce and Industry Minister, accompanied by the largest business delegation from India to New Zealand, comprising members of India’s three leading industry associations FICCI, CII and ASSOCHAM as well as representatives of prominent startups.</p> <p>The visit began with a warm welcome at Auckland Airport on 5 November 2025 by New Zealand’s Minister of Trade, Hon. Todd McClay, and the High Commissioner. On the evening of 5 November 2025, an India–New Zealand Business Forum was organised in collaboration with the Auckland Chamber of Commerce and was attended by over 300 key business leaders from both countries. A fireside chat was also held, during which Hon. Todd McClay and Mr. Goyal reaffirmed the strong commitment of both governments to take the bilateral economic relationship to new heights. Mr. Goyal highlighted areas for enhanced cooperation, including maritime, aerospace, defence, education, sports, and tourism, to expand the scope of the partnership.</p> <p>Mr. Goyal also participated in a community event in Auckland alongside PM Christopher Luxon and Hon. Todd McClay. PM Luxon warmly recalled his recent visit to India, expressed appreciation for the hospitality extended, and noted that the visit was successful and productive. The importance of celebrating 100 years of sporting ties in 2026 was also highlighted. At the community event, Mr. Goyal paid tribute to Mahatma Gandhi along with PM Luxon and Hon. Todd McClay.</p> <p>On 6 November 2025, Mr. Goyal was welcomed in Rotorua by Ms. Tania Tapsell, Mayor of Rotorua, and members of the Indian community. A cultural programme featuring a Māori welcoming ceremony with traditional dance was held at Te Puia. This was followed by an India–New Zealand CEO interaction with senior New Zealand leaders, including the newly appointed Indian-origin CEO of Air New Zealand, as well as CEOs from key sectors such as fintech, agriculture, horticulture, the meat industry, forestry, and tourism. Mr. Goyal outlined India’s attractiveness as an FDI destination, underscoring the significant opportunities and strategic value addition that India offers. He later attended another community event in Rotorua, where Vande Mataram was recited.</p>	

		On 7 November 2025, Mr. Goyal met Foreign Minister Hon.
